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## Industry Leaders Meet to Launch HHS Organ Donation Breakthrough Collaborative

On September 9-10, staff from OneLegacy and three Southern California partner hospitals joined HHS Secretary Tommy G. Thompson and leaders of over 100 large hospitals and 43 organ procurement organizations (OPOs) to launch a national initiative to generate significant increases in organ donation in the United States.



The hospital and OPO leaders, joined by several national healthcare organizations (including JCAHO, AHA and CMS) who have made a commitment to maximize the supply of available organs from deceased donors, convened in Washington to attend a two-day "Organ Donation Breakthrough Collaborative" learning session.

Together, these organizations agreed to join Secretary Thompson in an effort to increase organ donation rates from the current national average of 46 percent of eligible organ donors who die in hospitals to a target of 75 percent by adopting practices from hospitals and OPOs that already have high donation rates.

A recent article in the New England Journal of Medicine found that a high percentage of potential organ donors come from a relatively small pool of large hospitals like those represented at the September learning session.

"With their commitment to this initiative, hospital and organ procurement leaders are spearheading an historic opportunity to reduce

My name is Vicki Carey, and in 1995 I was involved in a serious car accident that took the life of my first child, Tyler Jonathan (T.J.).

I was in critical condition awaiting surgery when I was told the agonizing prognosis from Childrens Hospital Los Angeles: T.J. had been pronounced clinically brain dead.

My husband and I were compassionately told that even though T.J. was only one month old, that there were two other babies (each two months old) at the hospital that were themselves within days of dying if they did not receive heart and lung transplants. For my husband and I, the decision to have T.J. be a donor clearly stood out as being the right—the only—thing to do, especially if it

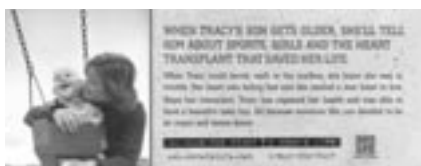


# Coalition on Donation 2003-04 General Market Campaign Features Empowering Testimonials, Call to "Donate Life"

# Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Honors Donor Within Their Own Family

In August the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department held the 2003 Patricia Madera de Waldie Memorial Golf Tournament in honor of the wife of a deputy (and daughter-in-law of Assistant Sheriff Larry L. Waldie) who passed away in May and became an organ donor. At the request of the Waldie family, the Sheriff's Department generously designated OneLegacy's family support programs as the beneficiary of the event's proceeds, which approached \$80,000.

The 144-player tournament attracted 152 players, with Carson City Towing, Inc., Commerce Casino, Gibson Dunn & Crutcher LLP and two proprietors of a Jiffy Lube franchise each supporting the event with top-level \$5,000 sponsorships.

Those present at Friendly Hills Country Club in Whittier were privileged to have Sheriff Leroy D. Baca share his heartfelt words to the Waldie and Madera families, which included a tribute to the family's decision to donate. A raffle, silent auction and live auction also contributed to fundraising efforts, the latter of which was hosted by Undersheriff William T. Stonich and Assistant Sheriff R. Doyle Campbell. Campbell is a 17-year liver recipient who together with his colleagues has been a longtime supporter of organ and tissue donation among the Sheriff's Department's close-knit "family" of 16,000 employees.

OneLegacy chief executive officer Tom Mone also addressed the awards dinner guests, expressing gratitude to the families, the Sheriff's Department and all present on behalf of the organization.

## 'Extended Criteria Donors' Increase Number of Organs Available for Transplant

As part of the national effort to increase the number of organs available for transplantation, the United Network for Organ Sharing (UNOS) now involves a special waiting list for voluntary kidney recipients.

The development comes in the aftermath extensive UNOS research regarding what, in the past, were termed "marginal" kidney donors (now known as Extended Criteria Donors). These were defined as older deceased organ donors with a past medical history of hypertension and/or

diabetes. Research showed that these kidneys had a greater chance of being successfully transplanted when cold time (the elapsed time between surgical recovery and transplantation, during which the kidneys are kept in an iced slush solution) was kept to an absolute minimum.

As of September 2002, patients who have agreed in advance to accept a kidney from an Extended Criteria Donor are placed on a special waiting list which uses "waiting time on the list" as the only allocation criterion. Each transplant center

enters patients on the list by blood type, assures that the patient has completed an extensive medical workup and is currently "ready" for transplantation. The transplant center knows which patient is at the top of the list for each blood type and can expedite the transplant procedure. Many of these voluntary recipients are older so the use of kidneys from these donors shortens their waiting time considerably.

Initial results by OneLegacy transplant centers show that the system works and success rates are extremely encouraging.

## Kern County Office Educates Bakersfield Police Department

The staff of OneLegacy's Kern County regional office educated the entire Bakersfield Police Department (BPD) on the role of law enforcement in organ donation as part of a bi-annual training that is required for all city police officers in the state of California.

The 13-week series of presentations was headed by Procurement Transplant Coordinator Kren Campbell, and supported by Assistant Regional Director Becky Bryant and Hospital Account Executive Robin McNabb. In all, 304 officers—including sergeants, detectives, patrol officers, traffic officers, DARE officers, community resource officers and homicide detectives—were educated over the course of 26 sessions.

"This training gives officers a new

understanding of how to work with OneLegacy on a case," says Ron Rice, Officer of Planning, Research and Training. "The investigative officers now understand that OneLegacy is not intrusive, and now we know how we can assist them in their job, and vice versa."



Ron Rice, Senior Police Officer for the Planning, Research, Training Division and SWAT Team/Paramedic, and Matt Eastman, Senior Police Officer, Training Division lauded the training program spearheaded by OneLegacy procurement coordinator Kren Campbell.

Since the training was completed, BPD has worked closely with OneLegacy to obtain release of two bodies in suspected homicide cases. Both became donors.

"Our response from many officers was that this education changed the way they perceive potential organ donors and donation itself both personally and in their work," says Campbell. "That's all we can hope for – to make a difference, one per-

son and one organization at a time, and we have been successful."

OneLegacy has been asked to present to BPD's next academy class, and also to continue as a regular participant in BPD education and training programs.

# HIPAA Privacy: Separating Myths from Facts

As of April 14, 2003, health care providers and health plans are required to be in compliance with the HIPAA Privacy Regulation. Both the 1996 Congress and the two recent administrations agree that a privacy law is needed to ensure that sensitive personal health information can be shared for core health activities, with safeguards in place to limit the inappropriate use and sharing of patient data. The HIPAA privacy rule takes critical steps in that direction to require that privacy and security be built in to the policies and practices of health care providers, plans, and others involved in health care.

Despite the law's clear purpose and scope, a lack of widespread and consistent public education, training, and technical assistance over the past 30 months has given rise to a number of persistent and destructive myths. Following are some common myths regarding the Rule and the facts about what the law actually says.

**Myth #1:** One doctor's office cannot send medical records of a patient to

another doctor's office without that patient's consent.

**FACT: No consent is necessary for one doctor's office to transfer a patient's medical records to another doctor's office for treatment purposes.** The Privacy Regulation specifically states that a covered entity "is permitted to use or disclose protected health information" for "treatment, payment, or health care operations," without patient consent. As HHS explains, "treatment" includes "consultation between health care providers regarding a patient and referral of a patient by one provider to another." HHS states that providing health records to another health care provider for treatment purposes "can be done by fax or other means." §§164.502(a)(1)(ii), 164.506(a).

**Myth #2:** The HIPAA Privacy Regulation prohibits or discourages doctor/patient emails.

**FACT: The Privacy Regulation allows providers to use alternative means of communication, such as email, with appropriate safeguards.** Doctors

and other healthcare providers may continue to communicate with patients via email. Both the HIPAA Privacy and Security Regulations require providers to use reasonable and appropriate safeguards to "ensure the confidentiality, integrity, and availability" of any health information transmitted electronically, and to "protect against any reasonably anticipated threats" to the security of such information. Therefore, a covered entity is free to continue using email to communicate with patients, but should be sure that adequate safeguards, such as encryption, are used. §§164.522(b)(1)(i), 164.306(a)(1)-(2), (d)(3)(i)-(ii), 164.312(e)(2)(ii).

## Eye Care for Comatose Patients: Nurses Can Make a Major Difference In Preserving Eyesight

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The eyes of patients in comas or on ventilators must be protected from drying and infection by routinely using copious amounts of antibiotic or lubricating ointments.

The Loma Linda Eye & Tissue Bank frequently gets permission to recover donor eye tissue from patients who were ventilator dependent prior to death. Some of these donors may have been in a comatose state for days.

Despite prophylaxis for other potential systemic problems, the eyes are often overlooked. This can cause permanent visual problems for the patient who recovers, or make the eyes unsuitable for transplantation if the patient expires.

In the comatose state the eyes are deprived of the protective mechanisms of blinking and tear production. Once the corneal epithelium has dried and broken down, a multitude of pathogens (usually present on the eyelids) can invade the cornea, causing infection, ulceration, scarring and even the loss of the eye. Clinically, the cornea may show fluorescein staining and white stromal infiltrates. In order to save the eye, cultures must be

# Inland Empire Coordinator Builds International Ties

OneLegacy Inland Empire procurement transplant coordinator Maria Stadler, RN, CPTC is leading efforts to build relationships between OneLegacy and ETCO/ESOT (European Transplant Coordinator Organization/European Society for Transplantation) as well as the OPO in Germany.

Ms. Stadler, a native of Germany, was invited to attend the 11th ETCO/ESOT/ELTO conference in Venice, Italy, generally considered the main European event for exchanging scientific information in the field of transplantation. At the September conference, she was voted into the law and ethics committee as the international representative for the United States

“It was a wonderful exchange of experience and thoughts to improve our work as an OPO towards the donor families,” said Stadler. “Working as a CPTC with OneLegacy and having a European background, I am able to explain some of the cultural differences within the U.S. and between the U.S. and Europe.”

Stadler’s international work began with initiating a relationship between the German OPO, DSO (German Foundation for Organ Donation) and OneLegacy. In

March 2002, she traveled to Munich for a presentation to DSO, which was followed by a guest speaking engagement alongside OneLegacy CEO Tom Mone at the August 2002 Annual Meeting for Organ Donation in Munich, Germany.

Based on this initial exchange, Stadler arranged a preliminary exchange program involving OneLegacy and DSO procurement coordinators with the goal of investigating the outcome and efficiency of a full-scale CPTC exchange program. In July 2003, a senior CPTC, Dr. Angelika Eder of the Munich DSO, came to Southern California for a two-week internship at the OneLegacy Inland Empire regional office, where she was introduced to our program, hospital development and also attended an organ donor case. The next month, Stadler volunteered to work for seven days at the DSO in Germany and observed their donor process and was part of an organ procurement case.

During her seven-day internship, Stadler met with Dr. Fischereder from the University of Munich. Dr. Eder and Prof. Fischereder have since invited

  - Tracy could barely walk to her mailbox due to a failing heart. Since her heart transplant, she has regained her health and had a beautiful baby boy.
  - Tyler, a 15-year-old cancer survivor, received a bone transplant which enabled him to keep his leg. “Sometimes I even tell girls I got my scar from a shark bite,” he says. “They love that.”

The campaign features radio, print, out-of-home and collateral materials, including a new general market brochure and poster series. Materials were distributed to the media the week of October 20th, while television spots will be released in time for National Donate Life Month in April 2004.

“Key to the success of the campaign will be our ability to motivate Southern California media outlets to air and publish these empowering messages,” says Bryan Stewart, Director of Communications for OneLegacy. “We hope our regional partners in the donation and transplantation community will be open to working together to generate placement opportunities.”

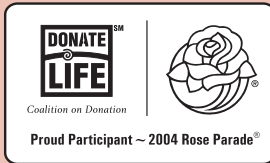

# Float Riders Bring Stories of Hope, Inspiration to Worldwide Audience

When the 2004 Rose Parade ushers in the New Year, it will also mark a milestone in raising awareness of the critical and growing need for organ and tissue donation as 22 donor family members, living donors and transplant recipients ride the first-ever Coalition on Donation Rose Parade float.

“We hope our float riders’ stories of adversity and triumph will help millions of parade viewers understand that through donation, we each have the power to help one another in a most profound way,” said Bryan Stewart, chairman of the Coalition’s float committee and director of communications for OneLegacy.

Riders were nominated by organ and tissue recovery organizations, foundations and transplant centers nationwide and range in age from 12 to 63. Fourteen are transplant recipients and seven are living donors or donor family members.

Leading the contingent are Dr. Kenneth P. Moritsugu, U.S. Deputy Surgeon General and an organ donor husband and father, and snowboarder Chris Klug, who received a life-saving liver transplant 18 months before winning a bronze medal at the 2002 Salt Lake City Olympics.

Of special interest are Los Angeles area residents Patricia Abdullah and Mike Jones, whose chance meeting at a personal development seminar inspired her to donate a life-saving kidney to him. According to doctors at Cedars-Sinai Medical Center, the only way they could have been a closer match was if they were born identical twins from the same cell—remarkable considering that Patricia is Caucasian and Mike is African American.

"I am one of those whose life was saved" by a transplant, wrote Foxen in the letter dated April 17, 2001. "It truly has made me a new person and I will forever be indebted to the family that made me the object of their generosity. I have been trying to find a way to repay society for this wonderful gift and I believe I have a good idea on how to do that."

Two-and-a-half years later, Gary is thrilled at the prospect of seeing his dream become

a reality.

"I'm glad so many people saw what I did: that a Rose Parade float would focus positive attention and bring a human face on the subject of organ and tissue donation and transplantation," Foxen said. "I have hope that our combined efforts will save the lives of many others by inspiring people to choose to donate."

On January 1st, Gary will be sitting in the grandstands alongside his wife Lois, who urged him to write the letter to Dr. Mendez.

"I'm very grateful to the organizers and supporters of who are making the float possible, because not all dreams are realized."

This New Year's Day, thanks to 55 organizations, dozens of contributors and hundreds of volunteers, this is one dream that will.

the organ waiting list and bring life and hope to the thousands of men, women and children who are waiting for a life-saving donation,” Secretary Thompson said.

Hospitals and OPOs work together to identify eligible organ donors, honor donation intentions as directed by the donor or the family and implement procedures to transfer donated organs to waiting recipients. Nationally, more than 82,000 people are currently waiting for an organ that could save or enhance their lives. Nearly 18 people die each day waiting for an organ.

300 hospitals throughout the United States have been identified by the Secretary as being the largest contributors to solving this crisis, 19 of them being within the OneLegacy service area. The first phase of this Collaborative has OneLegacy teaming up with Providence Holy Cross Medical Center in Mission Hills, Kern Medical Center in Bakersfield, and Los Angeles County-USC Medical Center.

During this intensive one-year initiative, participants aim to prove that by implementing best demonstrated practices throughout their hospitals, a significant increase in donor conversion will be achieved. The leaders will reconvene again next year to review progress, assess breakthroughs by participant teams and design further changes for more testing. Successful practices will then be expanded to other large U.S. hospitals, where 90 percent of all eligible donors are located.

Secretary Thompson announced the organ donation collaborative in April 2003. Its partners include the Institute for Healthcare Improvement (IHI), the Association of Organ Procurement Organizations (AOPO) and other key organizations in the transplantation and hospital communities. It utilizes the proven methodology of the “Breakthrough Collaborative” developed by IHI. In a collaborative, health leaders work together in an intensive “all-teach, all-learn” format over a period of months to improve performance outcomes, based on the best practices of peers who have already achieved high results.

taken and followed by intensive antibiotic therapy. However, once the cornea is infected, even the best treatment often leaves residual scarring that creates visual problems if the patient survives, or renders the donated tissue unacceptable for transplantation.

Exposure of the corneas and secondary infection can be avoided if the antibiotic or lubricating ointment is applied every four to six hours around the clock. Place about one quarter to one half inch or more of ointment (as it comes out of the tube) inside the lower eyelid. Then gently close the eye to warm and spread the medication. The following ointments are suggested in order of preference:

- ophthalmic anti-biotic ointment (Polysporin, Chloro-mycetin, or Neosporin)

- ophthalmic lubricating ointment (Refresh PM, Tears Renewed, or Dura-tears)
- pure petroleum jelly

It is also helpful to tape the eyelids shut. Attach wide tape (at least one inch) to the cheek and stretch it tightly to the center of the forehead. This will ensure complete eyelid closure and will prevent drying.

It is vital to protect the eyes of comatose patients. If the patient does not survive to appreciate your excellent care, a healthy cornea is potentially available for donation and the transplant recipient will be grateful for your thoughtful time and attention.

### National Kidney Foundation's U.S. Transplant Games

The U.S. Transplant Games is a four-day athletic competition for recipients of organ and bone marrow transplants. As much as the Games is an athletic event that calls attention to the success of organ and tissue transplantation, it is also a celebration of life among recipients, their families and friends.

The 2002 Games saw a record 10,000 athletes and supporters converge on Disney's Wide World of Sports in Orlando. Donor family liaisons were added to the team structure and donor families were actively recruited as official team members. Also introduced at the 2002 Games was "Transitions in Transplantation," a special program providing educational support and guidance to those who are involved with and affected by the organ donation process and transplantation. A cadre of celebrities attended the event and worked with the media to bring the issue of organ donation to the general public.

For Jatin Bhakta, a 23-year-old student at the University of Phoenix and member of Team Southern California, his first Transplant Games was a life-changing event. "It was great meeting all of the different athletes," Jatin says. "It's inspirational and

makes me want to do all I can to stay healthy so that I can compete again." Jatin was born with a kidney problem, one that was not detected until he was 18 months old. Luckily for Jatin, his mother was a perfect match and became a living donor.

Jatin's teammate Thomas Elias has competed in the Games since 1998. In 2002, Thomas competed in swimming and volleyball. "The great thing about the Games is that you're no longer alone as a transplant recipient," says Thomas. "You're with an utterly remarkable bunch of survivors."

What's the best thing about the Transplant Games? It's a vivid reminder of life. "Until you've had an organ fail, and been on some kind of life support, you don't know how precious life is," says Thomas. "I feel better than I have in 30 years." Jatin agrees, adding: "After a transplant, there's so much more you can do. It's the best feeling in the world."
