## Six-Year Streak Continues with 10% Increase in Organs

**ONELEGACY FACILITATES RECORD 373 ORGAN DONORS, NATIONAL RECORD 1,223 ORGANS TRANSPLANTED**

OneLegacy recorded its sixth consecutive record-breaking year in 2005, setting a national record in saving lives through organ donation and transplantation.

Working in concert with more than 200 hospital partners, OneLegacy recorded all-time highs of 373 organ donors and 1,223 recovered organs transplanted. The 1,223 organs transplanted in 2005 a national record for any single organ procurement organization (OPO) represents a 10% increase over the previous year and a jump of 34% since 2000.

OneLegacy's success has continued into 2006, with the organization recording a monthly high of 42 organ donors and 62 tissue donors in January, followed by 39 donors in February. OneLegacy recovers donated tissue in six of the seven counties in its service area as an FDA-registered tissue bank.

A single donor can save the lives of up to eight people through the donation of organs and help another 50 people live longer, fuller lives through the gift of tissue donation.

Thanks to our dedicated professional staff, support of our collaborative hospitals and, above all else, the generosity of the families we serve, OneLegacy continues to build on our track record of fulfilling our mission at record levels, said Tom Mone, chief executive officer



## Ardy Gau

# Sav-on Salutes Hugo Constantino with Call to Donate Life

Sav-on Drugs manager Hugo Constantino waited two years to be placed on the lung transplant waiting list, overcoming a series of health-related obstacles to be listed. Unfortunately, his stay on the list was brief, as he died waiting for the gift of a life-saving donated organ.

During his 33 years with Sav-on, Hugo trained over 300 up-and-coming managers and was truly loved by his staff. After Hugo's passing, his son Victor wrote a letter to all Sav-on employees asking that rather than send the family flowers or cards, they take the time to educate themselves about organ donation so that others will receive life-saving transplants.

My family and I have come to view organ donation as the ultimate act of love and charity, but we leave you to make your conclusions, wrote Victor. It is our fervent hope, however, that you will ultimately share our view and become an organ donor yourself. Even if you conclude that organ donation is not for you, we can think of no better testament to my father's memory than assisting others in donating life.

Victor's letter inspired Sav-on and Albertsons to raise over \$16,000.00 in Hugo's honor, with a check presentation to OneLegacy employees at Sav-on's Scottsdale, Ariz. headquarters. In December, a team of Sav-on managers and employees joined the Constantino family to decorate the Donate Life Rose Parade Float. In addition, more than 1,500 Sav-on and Albertsons associates have signed up on the Donate Life California Registry as part of a challenge in honor of Hugo.

Sav-on's support of donation continues into April's National Donate Life Month with the in-store sale of Donate Life green bracelets and the entry of a large Sav-on/Albertsons team at the Donate Life Run/Walk in April. 📍

## Registro de Done Vida California: Cómo funciona

Done Vida California es el registro electrónico donde los residentes de California mayores de 18 años pueden inscribirse para ser donantes de órganos y/o tejidos.

Una ley estatal aprobada el año 2003 autorizó a las cuatro organizaciones no lucrativas de recuperación de órganos de California a establecer y administrar un registro electrónico. Las organizaciones son California Transplant Donor Network (norte de California), Golden State Donor Services (rea de Sacramento), Lifesharing (rea de San Diego) y OneLegacy (Los Angeles y condados cercanos).

### ¿Por qué se necesita un registro?

Antes de que existiera el registro la responsabilidad de consentir a la donación recaía por completo en la familia del donante. Desafortunadamente, los miembros de la familia no siempre estaban al tanto de los deseos de su ser querido. Este registro eliminar cualquier duda que la familia pueda tener acerca de sus deseos de DONAR VIDA. Si una



persona llega a ser un donante potencial, a su familia se le entregará una copia de su registro para asegurar que sus deseos se cumplan.

### ¿Por qué debo inscribirme? ¿No es suficiente cargar una tarjeta de donante o tener el punto rosado en mi licencia de manejar?

El punto rosado en la licencia de conducir es un símbolo de la intención de ser donante, pero nunca ha tenido peso legal. La tarjeta de donante con firma y testigo otorga legalmente el permiso de recuperar órganos, sin embargo, debido a la conmoción que se vive cuando alguien está al borde de la muerte, raramente se encuentra una tarjeta de donante en el momento en el que se le habla a una familia acerca de la donación. Sin la documentación que demuestre la decisión del paciente, con frecuencia las familias se niegan a dar permiso para la donación.

En el registro Done Vida su deseo/compromiso de ser donante es

archivado en una base de datos segura y confidencial. Si tras su fallecimiento tiene la oportunidad de convertirse en donante de órganos y/o tejidos, a su familia se le presenta un documento oficial de su decisión y ellos no tendrán derecho a revocarlo. Si de acuerdo a los requisitos médicos usted puede ser donante, sus deseos serán respetados y los familiares no tendrán que tomar la difícil responsabilidad de tomar la decisión por usted.

La inscripción en el registro se verifica por medio de un e-mail que recibirá en un espacio de 30 días hábiles. Hasta que su firma electrónica no haya sido comprobada, su registro no será considerado activo. @



# 'Life Transformed' Shines Light on Rainy Rose Parade

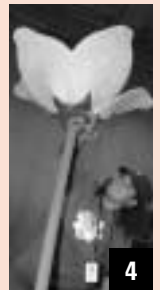
On January 2nd, the organ and tissue donation community was represented for a third consecutive year in the world's third most-watched entertainment event, the Tournament of Roses Parade. The Donate Life float was first envisioned in a letter from lung recipient Gary Foxen, who saw a float in "America's New Year Celebration" as a way to celebrate the gift of life and honor donor families. Following in the tradition of 2004's A Symphony of Life and 2005's Many Families, One Gift, the 2006 Donate Life Rose Parade Float, themed Life Transformed, featured 23 riders beneath a 40-foot-long fallen tree and surrounded by new life springing forth from its shelter.



Approximately 40 million U.S. television viewers and millions more in 150 countries watched the parade, as did more than 200,000 people who braved driving rain, which dampened the parade for the first time in 50 years. Approximately 145 media stories nationwide reached many millions more. Especially notable was coverage by Asian and Latino media, which were attracted to the Donate Life float's distinction as the first in the history of the parade with logos in both English and Spanish ("Done Vida").

The 2006 Donate Life float emerged as a national tradition in its own right, with float rider representatives from 13 states and the District of Columbia. In addition, the new Family Circle rose dedication program attracted 308 dedications from 36 states. The Donate Life Rose Parade Float Committee looks forward to continuing the float's mission to inspire the world to donate life with our fourth Rose Parade appearance on New Year's Day 2007.

## Donation After Cardiac Death: A Personal Experience

The patient was a 25-year-old female who was diagnosed as a baby with Rett Syndrome, a genetic degenerative neurological disorder. Over the course of years, the disease process had left Jamie without the ability to move and with the mental capacity of a six-month-old.

Upon admission to CCU she would be ventilator dependent. After many family conferences with the physician, the family felt their daughter had no quality of life and they made the difficult decision to withdraw the ventilator and provide comfort care for her. The mother had discovered that there was a neurological research center for Rett Syndrome and she desired to donate her daughter's brain to the research center after her death.

Headquartered at Children's Hospital of Orange County, I asked the mother if she would like help coordinating the donation with the research center. I also asked if she had also considered organ donation, and she had not. However, she was very interested, so I contacted OneLegacy so they could be available to answer

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questions and explain the process in detail. I also contacted the research center to coordinate the donation efforts. OneLegacy arrived that afternoon to talk with the patient's mother, and the primary researcher from the center also arrived. After explaining the options, the mother agreed to proceed with organ donation and the brain donation.

The unit became a beehive of activity as we set in motion all the paperwork and the steps to make the donation possible. I think it was very important for everyone to be aware that the decision to withdraw life support was a decision the family made based on their recognition that the patient's quality of life was non-existent. The decision to donate her organs was a separate matter.

When I returned the next day, the OneLegacy team was still there working. Throughout the day there was a stream of family

and friends to see Jamie and say goodbye to her. Later, we received word that the transplant team was flying in and setting up in the operating room. The family said their last goodbyes and we took the patient to the operating room.

The mother was the only family member who wanted to be present in the operating room. Before this, the transplant team prepped and draped the patient and then stepped out of the room. They were not allowed to begin the organ recovery until a full five minutes after the patient expired. If she did not expire within the one hour, she would be returned to her room for supportive care.

After the patient was prepared, the mother was then brought into the operating room. She sat with her for a while. The Chaplain offered a prayer and Jamie was removed from the ventilator. She was not able to breathe on her own and within a few minutes went

### New Donation Terminology Recommended

Last May, the Donor Family Council of the Association of Organ Procurement Organizations (AOPO) approved the use of new terminology about donation. The council reasoned that avoiding words and phrases that cause concern among donor families and the general public will increase both understanding and acceptance of the donation process. These terminology updates are unanimously supported by the American Society of Transplantation (AST) and American Society of Transplant Surgeons (ASTS) and have been adopted by the American Journal of Transplantation.

into cardiac arrest. She was then pronounced dead. After the five minutes, the mother was escorted out and the transplant team began recovery.

In the sadness of losing this patient, I couldn't help but think of the contrast between the sadness of this family and the joy of the people that would be recipients of the donated organs. It seemed to bring a balance knowing that for this family, the loss of their daughter was allowing other people to have their prayers answered. I can only hope that if others are in the difficult position of withdrawing life support from someone they love, they would consider donation after cardiac death. It is a viable option that can help many and bring some closure to the family as they grieve the loss of their loved one. @

# 2005: Six-Year Streak of Record Number of Lives Saved

of OneLegacy. The growth in organ and tissue donation translates directly into lives saved and enhanced in our seven-county area. We attribute this growth to the combined impact of national, state and local initiatives. Media stories on donation also contribute significantly to rising awareness about the importance of donation and encourage families to reach these life-saving decisions.

A major contributor to OneLegacy's record numbers has been the Organ Donation Breakthrough Collaborative, a nationwide initiative launched in 2003 to save and enhance thousands of lives a year by spreading known best practices to the nation's largest hospitals and to achieve organ donation rates of 75% or higher in these hospitals.

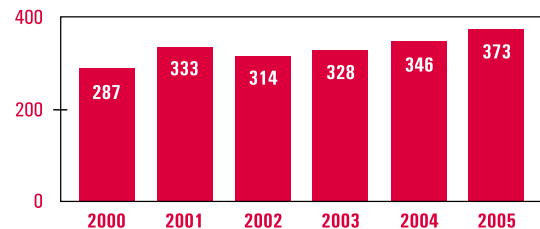
Another key contributor has been rising consent rates, which have increased from 49% to 55.5%. Consent rates calculate the number of families who agree to donation at the time they are approached. A related performance measure is the conversion rate, which gauges how many eligible referrals (based on medical suitability) result in actual donors; some consented cases result in organs not being recovered, mainly as a result of disqualifying medical conditions. The conversion rate has exceeded the consent rate's steady climb, going from 47% in 2000 to 57%, or a 21% increase.

Operationally, a key focus continues to be the optimal medical management of donors. Last year, nearly 3.3 lives were saved by every donor. When a family says yes to donation, we owe it to them to make sure their loved one saves as many lives as possible, said Renee Hawthorne, chief operating officer for OneLegacy. From responding to referrals on a timely basis to ensuring the organ function of each organ is maintained and improved prior to transplant and by placing the organs with the appropriate recipient quickly, our donation coordinators and support teams are key to maximizing the generous gift of every donation.

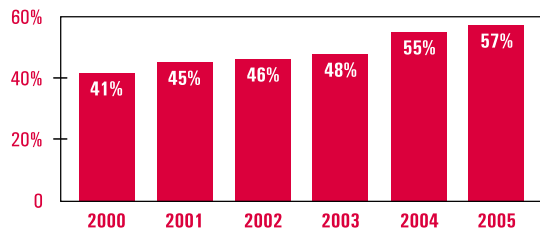
As a result of the outstanding performance of OneLegacy and California's three other OPOs, the number of patients listed in California for extra-renal organs actually stabilized for the first time in 2005. The number of kidney transplant candidates continues to climb, however, and now number more than 14,000 in the state and 64,000 nationwide.

While we are seeing real progress toward meeting the demand, the reality is that the availability of donated organs is not keeping pace with the waiting list, said Mone. We will continue to seek out every possible opportunity to make an impact, from collaborating with hospitals to training staff, applying the latest technology and inspiring the community to donate life. We will continue to expand our reach to ensure that donor families and transplant recipients alike — not to mention their families and communities — benefit from the gift of organ donation and transplantation. 🌀

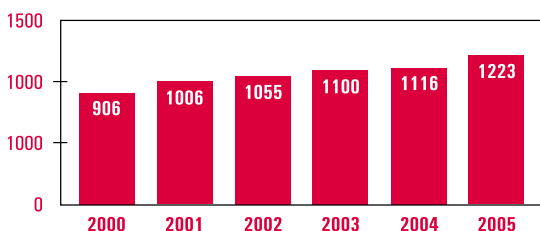
**Organ Donors, 2000-2005**



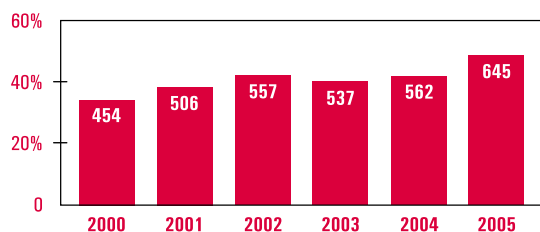
**Organ Donor Conversion Rate, 2000-2005\***

# Give Thanks, Give Life Campaign Engages Local Clergy

Last October, community development coordinators Sabrina Ho, Kathleen Hostert and Vanessa Van Nguyen organized two clergy meetings to launch Donor Sabbath season and help clergy understand organ and tissue donation in a religious context.

Sabrina Ho hosted seven houses of worship at Garfield Medical Center, with many representing the nearby Chinese community. Also in attendance were representatives from Asians for Miracle Marrow Matches (A3M), Garfield Hospital and Monterey Park Hospital.

The clergy meeting at Mater Dei High School in Santa Ana provided the opportunity for members of all religious backgrounds to participate on the importance of sharing organ and tissue donation with their church. Representatives from across Orange County attended the event and heard firsthand the growing need for organ donation from kidney transplant

still wishes they had hugged each other goodbye instead of simply shaking hands.

During this difficult time of emotional turmoil, Mr. and Mrs. Gau made the extraordinary choice of agreeing to donate their son's organs. As I look back, even though he is gone, the fact that his organs are continuing to help someone else live a good life makes it much more real that he is not really gone. Instead, part of him is still alive, still here with me and my family on Earth, says Mr. Gau.

In 2003, the Gau family had the honor of representing the Southern California community at the National Donor Recognition Ceremony in Washington DC. Mr. Gau was awarded a medal by the United States

Department of Health and Human Services for his courage and generosity that led to the extension of three lives.

But despite all of this, many of the Gau family's relatives in the States and in Taiwan still have a difficult time accepting the idea of organ donation. They seem to grasp on to the traditional Chinese thinking that humans should be buried whole, notes Mr. Gau.

From my experience, I want people to know that death does not mean an end to life, said Mr. Gau. Organ donation, in fact, can help your family establish a legacy of the loved one who is no longer around. What is important is for people to understand what it means to be a donor and how comforting it has been to my family to know that we made a gift of love on his behalf. 🍷
